If yes, please indicate: (a) individual's relationship to you; (b) nature of the offense; and (c) disposition of the charge (*i.e.* imprisonment, probation, fine, etc.). Follow-up questions can take place outside the presence of other jurors, if you prefer.

13. Have you had any experiences that left you with a negative or positive impression of judges, the judicial system, prosecutors and/or defense attorneys? If yes, you will be asked to explain during later questioning.

14. Do you have a family member or close friend who is a lawyer specializing in criminal law, either as a prosecutor or defense attorney? 15. Are you or is a member of your family or a close friend involved in law enforcement as an agent or officer?
