STATEMENT OF WORK (SOW)

1.1 INTRODUCTION:

The United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois ("Court") is seeking quotations for maintenance needed on the woodwork and doors throughout 3 courtrooms at the Dirksen Federal Courthouse, located at 219 S. Dearborn, Chicago, IL 60604.

1.2 OBJECTIVES:

The Court is looking to secure the services of a contractor that can complete the following objective:

1. Refresh wood paneling, back wall slats, Judges Bench, Courtroom Deputy Bench, Jury Box and doors in accordance with the scope defined below.

1.3 SCOPE:

The contractor must complete the following items consistent to achieve the project objectives:

- Clean, lightly scuff, repair gauges, oil and touch-up all paneling, back wall slats, Judges Bench, Courtroom Deputy Bench, Jury Box, Spectator Benches, Attorney Tables, and doors, in the courtroom.
 - o Courtroom 2503
 - o Courtroom 2541
 - o Courtroom 2325
- All material, samples and finishes shall match existing conditions.
- Work must be completed off hours due to noise and/or odor. Off hours include nights (6PM -4AM) and
 weekends. If premium pay is necessary, this must be included and noted in the quote sheet. Dates for
 painting are TBD and will be staggered.
- Courtrooms must be left clean and free of debris.
- If any of the work is performed off site, the contractor must receive approval prior to the start of work.
- Workers are responsible for protecting all government property (furnishings, carpet, etc).
- All courtroom technology and equipment will be removed by the District Court prior to the start of work.
- Work must be completed in one area before proceeding to the next.
- All finishes must be approved by the United States District Court for acceptance.
- Work in each courtroom must be completed based on scope of work and agreed schedule.
- Clean the area every night for occupancy the next day. Protect all finishes from damage. Note all preexisting damage to other areas.
- Onsite parking is not available.
- Work equipment may be stored within the workspace during the duration of the work only.

1.4 SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS:

- Contractor must provide three references. References must include similar wood restoration type projects.
- Any contractor providing a quote for this project must have at least five years' experience with commercial level wood restoration and have the manpower, equipment and tools required to complete the work to industry standards.
- Contractor will attend a pre-construction meeting prior to project start to work out schedule.
- Contractor will provide an onsite Supervisor with thorough knowledge and understanding of the designated work assignments, tools and equipment employed in the execution of this contract, and of the rules, regulations and standards of the industry.

- The Supervisor will be available to oversee and inspect all oiling, ensure that all areas are left clean each
 night and will be accountable during all working hours to oversee performance of all obligations under this
 contract.
- The court freight elevator is sensitive to excessive weight, movements and length of door held open. Crew must be careful when using the freight elevator to move oil cans and equipment.
- The contractor will work at the convenience of the court on Courts' established schedule prior to an award and must be available to complete the work evenings and weekends.
- Number of crew members shall be appropriate for amount of work to be completed in a given night.
- At no time shall the contractor have access to the Judiciary IT Network or Bench and Bar Wi-Fi.

1.5 REVIEW PERIOD AND ACCEPTANCE CRITERIA FOR DELIVERABLES:

- The Court will review each area with the Supervisor within 24 hours of completion of work completion. Any discrepancies will be noted and must be addressed within 72 hours of the review.
- All trash, remnants, etc., shall be removed and space completely cleaned upon completion of project.
- If necessary, contractor will return for touch-ups as needed to meet approval of the Court.

2.0 PROJECT LOGISTICS:

2.1 SITE ACCESS:

The contractor shall coordinate all working hours and access with the Court. Please note that the courthouses are high-security environments. The contractor shall maintain all security perimeters at all times, during the installation. Locked doors shall not be propped open, and spaces that are unlocked for the installation work shall be relocked before the area is left unattended.

2.2 IDENTIFICATION:

The contractor's installation team shall, at all times, wear photographic identification as issued by the building security personnel. The contractor shall coordinate acquiring identification from the Court prior to the start of the project. The project schedule shall not be delayed due to delays in processing building access or obtaining acceptable identification.

2.3 COORDINATION:

The contractor shall at all times communicate with the Court's Facilities Representative all site issues that impact the project in any way other than what has been established. Such communication shall be conveyed in email.

The contractor shall not take direction from any individual other than the Court's Facilities Representative at the site in any way that may cause a change of defined scope, a cost or credit to the project, add additional labor, or delay the project. All issues that arise are to be brought to the attention of the Court's Contracting Officer at once for resolution.

2.4 OCCUPANCY REQUIREMENTS:

The Court will occupy the site and existing building during the entire project. Cooperate with the Court during construction operations to minimize conflicts and facilitate Court usage. Complete the work so as not to interfere with the operations.

2.5 SECURITY:

All personnel representing the contractor entering the courthouses for installation work must be able to pass a background screening before starting any work on-site. Upon request and prior to the project's start date, the contractor must provide the Court with each employee's completed Authorization to Release Information form (See Attachment). This form is required to conduct the appropriate security check of all individuals the vendor proposes to work within the Courthouse.

3 SCHEDULE:

The work shall be completed in accordance with the schedule as specified in Section 1.3 Scope.

HEALTH & WELFARE: \$5.36 per hour, up to 40 hours per week, or \$214.40 per week or \$929.07 per month

HEALTH & WELFARE EO 13706: \$4.93 per hour, up to 40 hours per week, or \$197.20 per week, or \$854.53 per month*

*This rate is to be used only when compensating employees for performance on an SCA-covered contract also covered by EO 13706, Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors. A contractor may not receive credit toward its SCA obligations for any paid sick leave provided pursuant to EO 13706.

VACATION: 2 weeks paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor, 3 weeks after 5 years, and 4 weeks after 15 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor, wherever employed, and with the predecessor contractors in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. (Reg. 29 CFR 4.173)

HOLIDAYS: A minimum of twelve paid holidays per year: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Juneteenth National Independence Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. A contractor may substitute for any of the named holidays another day off with pay in accordance with a plan communicated to the employees involved.) (See 29 CFR 4.174)

THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE NUMBERED FOOTNOTES IN PARENTHESES RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING:

1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: This wage determination does not apply to any individual employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity, as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. (See 41 C.F.R. 6701(3)). Because most Computer Systems Analysts and Computer Programmers who are paid at least \$27.63 per hour (or at least \$684 per week if paid on a salary or fee basis) likely qualify as exempt computer professionals under 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(1) and 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(17), this wage determination may not include wage rates for all occupations within those job families. In such instances, a conformance will be necessary if there are nonexempt employees in these job families working on the contract.

Job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry, and are not determinative of whether an employee is an exempt computer professional. To be exempt, computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements must also have a primary duty that consists of:

(1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures, including consulting with users, to determine hardware, software or system functional specifications;

(2) The design, development, documentation, analysis, creation, testing or modification of computer systems or programs, including prototypes, based on and related to user or system design specifications;

- (3) The design, documentation, testing, creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or
- (4) A combination of the aforementioned duties, the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).

Any computer employee who meets the applicable compensation requirements and the above duties test qualifies as an exempt computer professional under both section 13(a)(1) and section 13(a)(17) of the Fair Labor Standards Act. (Field Assistance Bulletin No. 2006-3 (Dec. 14, 2006)). Accordingly, this wage determination will not apply to any exempt computer employee regardless of which of these two exemptions is utilized.

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

** HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL **

An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance, explosives, and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening, blending, dying, mixing, and pressing of sensitive ordnance, explosives, and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide, black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization, modification, renovation, demolition, and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance, explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving re-grading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with, or in close proximity to ordnance, (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands, face, or arms of the employee engaged in the operation, irritation of the skin, minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving, unloading, storage, and hauling of ordnance, explosive, and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance, explosives, and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to

this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However, in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of ""wash and wear"" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

** SERVICE CONTRACT ACT DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONS **

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"", Fifth Edition (Revision 1), dated September 2015, unless otherwise indicated.

** REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE, Standard Form 1444 (SF-1444) **

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(i)). Such conforming procedures shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)). The Wage and Hour Division shall make a final determination of conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits which shall be paid to all employees performing in the classification from the first day of work on which contract work is performed by them in the classification. Failure to pay such unlisted employees the compensation agreed upon by the interested parties and/or fully determined by the Wage and Hour Division retroactive to the date such class of employees commenced contract work shall be a violation of the Act and this contract. (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(v)). When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF-1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order the proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the U.S. Department of Labor, Wage and Hour Division, for review (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.

5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.

6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF-1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" should be used to compare job definitions to ensure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.152(c)(1))."
